## **Proposition** Federal Funding for Special Education





Federal funds account for almost 10 percent of a district's budget, with a focus on serving the nation's most vulnerable students. This document provides a brief summary of the various funding streams in the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) and Individuals with Disabilities Act (IDEA) that can be used to support unique learners, parents, special education professionals, and special education administration. **Additional information** is available from the U.S. Department of Education.
