



The SMART-est IEP process: **AN IEP TIME STUDY**

A fourth-grade student diagnosed with autism was due for her annual IEP review in December 2023. This student has areas of need in English/language arts, math, social, communication, behavioral, and gross and fine motor skills. She gets instruction based on a modified core curriculum aligned to extended standards and takes part in alternate assessment. When her IEP was up for renewal a time study was conducted comparing two different IEP writing processes. One involved using n2y Benchmark assessments and the Polaris IEP development solution, while the other involved unaided baseline data collection and other common IEP development processes.

The student's IEP was written using two approaches, with and without Polaris:
